although burdened with limits, still strong with pride.





auditions and she was SUPER excited! She placed third in the Miss Black Alabama Pageant!






Under the mentorship of his pastor and prayer partner, Pastor Vincent, Johnny embraced his newfound faith and was baptized, marking a significant turning point in his life.

With heartfelt remembrance and deep admiration, we honor the legacy of Rendon A. Marbury, Jr. His unwavering dedication, profound impact, and enduring spirit continue to inspire all who had the privilege of knowing him.

This section includes a tribute to his remarkable life, his contributions, and the lasting imprint he leaves on our hearts.

THE HONORABLE MARY BUSH



The Honorable Mary Bush is one of the top women in the world in international finance and corporate governance. She has served on more than a dozen boards of major, global public companies, including Marriott, T. Rowe Price, Discover Financial Services, Texaco and United Airlines. She has chaired Governance and Audit Committees, served on Finance and Compensation Committees and chaired or served on the Boards of several charitable organizations. While in the corporate world - - with Chase Manhattan Bank, Citibank, Bankers Trust and Fannie Mae, she became widely known for ground-breaking transactions with multinational companies and investors.

Ms. Bush served three Presidents – as U.S. Director on the IMF Board, head of the Federal Home Loan Bank System during the S&L crisis and Board member of Sallie Mae. At the

IMF, she represented the US government on critical policy matters during the 1980s emerging market debt crisis and led the creation of a new lending program that propelled developing countries toward free-markets and entrepreneurship. She also chaired a bipartisan congressional commission to transform the \$32 billion of U.S. foreign aid to give greater emphasis to investment and human resource development. She also was appointed by US Treasury Secretary, Hank Paulson, to the U.S. Treasury Committee on the Audit Profession.

Ms. Bush advises government and corporate leaders and is a frequent speaker on economic, governance and financial matters. She speaks to youth audiences on the power of strong values and self-determination. She was one of NACD's top 100 Directors in 2012. Current boards include Bloom Energy, ManTech International and Private Export Funding Corporation. She is Chairman of Spark the Journey, a not-for-profit that mentors low-income youth through high school and college. Her M.B.A. is from the University of Chicago and her B.A. in Economics, Phi Beta Kappa, Magna Cum Laude, is from Fisk University.

Education: M.B.A. in Finance, Chicago Booth, University of Chicago. B.A., Phi Beta Kappa, Magna Cum Laude, Fisk University. She was born in Birmingham, Alabama and resides in Chevy Chase, Maryland.

REVEREND CALVIN WALLACE WOODS, SR.



Bishop Calvin Wallace Woods, Sr., a prominent civil rights leader and advocate, has been a pivotal figure in Birmingham, Alabama, for over seven decades. His involvement in the community began in 1963 when he led the Transition Committee to integrate business sectors post-demonstrations. That year, he filed a lawsuit on behalf of his daughter and other students suspended for their roles in demonstrations, ensuring their reinstatement.

Woods was a key organizer of the Alabama Christian Movement for Human Rights (ACMHR) under Dr. Fred L. Shuttlesworth after the NAACP was outlawed in Alabama in 1956. ACMHR focused on non-violent direct action to combat racial injustice, including boycotts, picketing, and voter registration efforts.

In 1966, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. appointed Woods as the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) City Convener for Birmingham. His role was to educate ministers on civil rights issues, including history, non-violent protest, and voter registration. He was arrested several times for advocating desegregation, including for encouraging his congregation to sit anywhere on city buses. Woods was also imprisoned for sitting at a lunch counter and beaten after Dr. King's room was bombed. He faced repeated threats from the Ku Klux Klan.

Woods served as President of the Birmingham Metro Chapter of the SCLC until 2021 and is currently 1st Vice President of the National SCLC. He was honored with a state marker in 2014 for over 57 years of civil rights activism.

Bishop Woods is a native of Birmingham and the son of Rev. Dr. Abraham Lincoln Woods, Sr. and Maggie Rose Woods. He and his deceased wife, Lucille, are proud parents of thirteen children. He served as Pastor of Shiloh Baptist Church in Norwood for 35 years and is now Pastor Emeritus. He graduated from A.H. Parker High School, Miles College, and the Birmingham Easonian Baptist Bible College, and has received four honorary doctorate degrees. He retired as an administrator from the Birmingham Board of Education. Woods has dedicated his life to ministry, preaching for over 70 years, impacting countless lives through his faith and leadership

RENDON A. MARBURY, JR.



Rendon A. Marbury, Jr. was born on June 30, 1937, the eldest of nine children to Rendon and Eula Bell Rose Marbury, Sr. He took great pride in being a big brother.

A 1956 graduate of R.R. Moton High School, Rendon was a standout quarterback. Inspired by stories of Satchel Paige at Rickwood Field, he dreamed of playing for the Birmingham Black Barons. That dream became reality when he joined the Negro Leagues, playing for the Black Barons and Indianapolis Clowns. Known as "Jug" Marbury, he was a skilled line-drive hitter with a rifle arm, excelling at double plays.

He endured racism firsthand, often denied service at restaurants or forced to sleep on buses. Years later, he received a mere \$3.26

royalty check from MLB, which he never cashed—preserving it as a symbol of the past. Despite challenges, he never harbored bitterness, believing God, not baseball, was the author of his faith.

Rendon was honored for his contributions to the Negro Leagues, featured in museums in Kansas City and Birmingham, and celebrated at the Rickwood Classic and the Atlanta Braves Stadium. He also helped organize the "Great Baseball Festival" in Leeds, Alabama.

In 1958, he began a 39-year career at ACIPCO, interrupted by U.S. Army service. Before deploying, he married Annie Lois Jackson, and together they raised three children—Perrin, Allison, and Angie. Following retirement, he drove buses for Birmingham City Schools for 10 years.

A devoted member of Ephesus Seventh-day Adventist Church, he served as Head Deacon and Bible Teacher. He was admired by many for his great storytelling and tremendous ability to impart wisdom to people of all ages.

His children and grandchildren are forever grateful for his dedication, ensuring they attended church school and graduated college. Rendon rejoiced in their success but found even greater joy in their commitment to Christ as Seventh-day Adventist Christians.


Rendon departed this life on June 4, 2023, surrounded by his loving family.
